

In Memory of Dr. Tom Smith

After a lengthy battle with failing health, Dr. Tom Smith passed away on May 29, 2023

Dr. Smith earned his DDS degree from The University of Texas Dental Branch in 1967. After serving three years in the United States Army, he completed a residency in periodontics at Baylor University College of Dentistry.

Tom began his practice in Longview in 1972. He began his involvement in organized dentistry and community service at the start of his dental career. He belonged to, the East Texas Dental Society, the Gregg County Dental Society, the

Southwest society of Periodontists, and the Land O'Pines Dental Study Club. He was also a member of the American Academy of Periodontology.

Tom was a member of the First Lutheran Church where he sang in the Chancel Choir and served on the committees, taught Bible Study Fellowship, and volunteered with youth activities. He was a Master Mason and a charter member of the Kiwanis Club, as well as many other community organizations.

I had the privilege of participating in the same office complex with Tom for fortyone years. We visited daily about our mutual patients. My patients always received excellent periodontal treatment at his hands.

Tom was liked and respected throughout Texas for his excellence as a clinician and his willingness to serve organized dentistry.

Tom is survived by his wife of 57 years, Susan Kay, and his sons, Todd and Sterling and their families. He is also survived by two brothers, Dr. David Smith and Dr. Mark Smith as well as many relatives throughout the USA.

PEER REVIEW: A Benefit of Membership

Did you know?

Peer Review is accessible to you!

Peer review is an informal process where local dentists help resolve problems your patients may have with your care. It's not a court and it doesn't punish anyone. TDA Peer Review Committees are made up of volunteer dentists chosen for their skills and knowledge.

Matters accepted for Peer Review

- Appropriateness of Care: Did the dentist give the right treatment for your condition?
- Quality of Treatment: Was the treatment done correctly according to professional standards?

Matters not accepted for Peer Review

- Complaints that are not related to care quality or appropriateness.
- Complaints against non-member dentists.
- Payment or billing disputes.
- · Customer service or staff behavior issues.
- Insurance disputes.
- Cases already in court.
- Complaints that have already been filed with the Texas State Board of Dental Examiners.

If you would like more information about this process or need to direct a patient where to file a complaint, email drogers@tda.org or call 512-443-3675, ext 153. At that time they will contact our local peer review committee. (This process helps keep our patients from going to the board first.)

Once the peer review committee has been called to investigate a case, this limits the patients options to file a complaint to the board.
